

We are thankful to be in Phase 1 of reopening our Church for worship following the Coronavirus shutdown.

Two on-campus worship services are held on Sundays at **9:00 AM and 11:00 AM**

with sanitation of the sanctuary and restrooms before and after each service. Doors open 15 minutes before the service.

You may continue to connect at 11:00 AM online via Livestream at www.fbchhi.org, our Facebook page or our Youtube channel.

According to the new ordinance from the Hilton Head Island Town Council, face masks are now required inside when we gather for worship.

Face masks, tissues and hand sanitizer are available at entry doors.

Worship services have been adjusted for no contact. Offerings can be dropped into the offering boxes found at each doorway.

We will continue with Phases 2 and 3 at a later date if allowed. The next two phases consist of returning to Sunday School classes and Children's Church in Phase 2, with small groups beginning again in the fall in Phase 3.

Committees are meeting on-campus again, wearing face masks and using physical distancing measures in the Family Life Center Multi-purpose Room.

Additional ushers are needed for each service. If you are willing to be an usher in one or both of our worship services, please call Will Libertoff at 843-715-5985.

Mask Ordinance and Impact on Church Activities

Per the recent decision and new ordinance from our town council, **face masks are now required** in all commercial establishments on Hilton Head, which includes religious spaces. So, beginning Wednesday, July 1, it is required by law that you wear a face mask while inside all buildings on our church campus for worship services or meetings. Our staff will wear a mask whenever someone is present in the offices. We will continue to have masks available at all doors to the Sanctuary, the front door to the office, and the front door to the Family Life Center.

There is a clause under section 6 of this new ordinance that reads as follows:

6. The following persons are exempt from the requirements of this ordinance:

- i. Any person who is unable to safely wear a Face Covering due to age, an underlying health condition, or who is unable to don or remove the Face Covering without the assistance of others is exempt from the requirements of this ordinance;
- ii. Persons eating or consuming food and beverages;
- iii. Persons receiving medical care or treatment;

At this time, we will assume that anyone not wearing a mask while on the church campus has one of those reasons listed above.

Now, let me say a few things that are important:

- Please practice honesty and integrity in this. Let us not become divided over a non-Gospel issue like wearing a mask as some churches have recently done.
- We fully understand that this is not convenient, but we do believe that God calls us to honor our authorities in matters like these. I do not in any way believe that this is an attack on church liberty or religious freedom. This is a blanket ordinance equally applied to all businesses in all sectors of the community.
- Also, understand that any business that is found out of compliance with this ordinance can be fined, and after repeated offenses, declared a nuisance resulting in having their business license revoked. I do not mention this out of fear. If this were a Gospel issue, I would be more willing to take a risk. This is not a Gospel issue, and because the Bible calls us to be compliant with our government, what message would it send to be out of compliance and not seeking the good (health) of our community at large?
- Please ponder this. The staff has heard from several members who do have legitimate health concerns that are not comfortable returning to on-campus worship until the majority of those in attendance are wearing masks. Whether you agree with their concerns or not is irrelevant. Personally, if by wearing a mask I can make someone more comfortable joining us for worship, then I will wear a mask.

If you have any questions, do not hesitate to reach out to me. I'd be happy to answer any questions you have or help explain this in greater detail over the phone or in person. These are crazy days, but let us not confuse issues that are not eternal with those that are.

Here are a couple of verses God has been challenging me with as related to these matters:

Jeremiah 29:7 — *“Pursue the well-being of the city I have deported you to. Pray to the Lord on its behalf, for when it thrives, you will thrive.”*

Philippians 2:3 — *“Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others as more important than yourselves.”*

1 Corinthians 9:22 — *“I have become all things to all people, so that I may by every possible means save some.”*



From The Pastor

Dear Church Family,

Happy Independence Day!

We take this time each year to slow down and thank God, and all of those who sacrificed greatly so that we can now enjoy the incredible freedoms available to us in the United States of America. God has truly and richly blessed us, and I believe He calls us to be a blessing to those around us. So, seek ways to do that both locally and globally.

Racial Division and Our Response

On the topic of our country, I am so broken-hearted over the division in our country right now. I do not know of a time when the rhetoric has been as divisive. Recent events have shown that there is still a deep thread of unhealed racial tension in our country, and there are organizations and groups that are clearly stirring up the tension for their own purposes. What I would ask you to pray about is how can God use us, as the Church, to rise above the pressure to side with divisive organizations while still taking a God-honoring stand against any sort of racial injustice. We can and should take a stand against sin, while also communicating from a basis of love, not hate. How can we do that? It is difficult to hate those you truly know. If you struggle to identify with those of a different race, try building a relationship with someone who doesn't look like you. Hear their story. Get to know them. By the way, this will help in building a relationship with anyone, even of the same race. I realize that I have no idea what some of my black brothers and sisters, including some in our fellowship, have experienced in their lives. The more I hear their stories, the more I grow in compassion for those who have been stereotyped or prejudiced against based on something as ridiculously insignificant as the color of their skin. Personally, my life has been incredibly enriched by people of other races. God created us all. He loves us all, and He calls us to love all. Christians sharing the love of Christ and loving others with the love of Christ is the only thing that will bring healing to our country.

COVID-19 Response

We are still in the first stage of our reopening process. This essentially includes having on-campus Sunday morning worship services and on-campus committee/leadership meetings. Our average attendance between the two services in June on Sundays has been about 145. While we continue to encourage you to make the best decision for your family between worshiping with us in person or worshiping online, I can tell you that we have ample space in the Sanctuary for more people to attend in either of these two services while still

maintaining physical distancing. There have only been a couple people in the balcony in any given service thus far, leaving a lot of open space, and there is still a good amount of space available on the floor as well. So, if you are contemplating a return to on-campus worship, but still want space around you while distancing from others, there is ample room. We plan to continue two Sunday services as long as needed, and are even open to adding another time of worship in the coming months should the need arise.

We continue to provide face masks and hand sanitizer at every Sanctuary entrance, and we continue to limit physical interaction, service length, and the number of songs. So, while there is always a risk in any public venue for illness, we are doing the best we can to keep everyone as safe as possible following the guidelines given to us.

We do not yet know when we will enter the second stage of this process, which includes restarting on-campus and off-campus small group studies, including Sunday School. However, know that our Administrative Council is monitoring the situation and will make that prayerful decision as best and as soon as we can.

As you can see in this newsletter, Brian Parker has begun having with some youth events, which is so crucial in the lives and spiritual development of our young people. You can see in the Youth Ministry section what is going on, but I wanted to reassure you that they are also being as safe as possible with their events. Most of these events are held outside to mitigate risks.

Risks and Relationships

As many of you continue to distance socially, strive to make sure that you press forward in deepening relationships with people. The main thing that concerns me in this COVID-19 situation is that the churches across the country and around the world will lose ground, because in our effort to remain safe, we will lose our Christian influence on the lives of those around us. Scripture is filled with people like Paul who pressed forward with the Gospel message even when it placed him in harm's way. I'm not telling you to place yourself in a dangerous position, but I am telling you that as followers of Christ, we do not have the option of distancing ourselves from obedience to the Great Commission... and that requires relationships. Christ told Peter that even the gates of Hell would not prevail against the Church. I take comfort in that statement in a time like this. And I also realize my role as a Christ-follower in working alongside God to seek His glory and the growth of His Church, no matter the cost



Independence Day lessons for church life

- **Return to the basics** — On July 4th we commemorate the origins of our country. In terms of faith, we also periodically need to hear again the foundational stories of Creation, the Israelites and, of course, Jesus.
- **Honor the gift of freedom** — "For freedom Christ has set us free ... do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (Galatians 5:1, ESV). We strive as citizens to preserve and live out our national freedom. Likewise, as citizens of God's kingdom we live gladly in the freedom of salvation and share that gift with others.
- **Enjoy community** — July 4 is known for picnics, parades and other community gatherings. Similarly, the church is nourished by coming together for worship, meals and other special events.
- **Be light in the darkness** — As fireworks brighten the sky with light and color, the church is called to display the Gospel's unique light in a dark world. Our word dynamite and the Greek word for power — as in, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you" (Acts 1:8) — share a root. From the Music Ministry...

*"I was glad when they said unto me, "Let us go into the house of the LORD."

I echo the sentiments of this psalm as we have finally returned to church for worship! How wonderful it was to be able to come back together and see members of our church family as we sing praises to God and bless His great Name. As time goes by and we hopefully see an end to this virus crisis, we look forward to seeing many more returning to meet with us once again. But for today, we remain grateful for God's faithfulness.

As of June 10th, the Sanctuary Choir has also returned to resume our weekly choir rehearsals. This has been interesting! Although there are some who are still somewhat reluctant to join us yet (which is totally acceptable and reasonable), we still had a total of 17 people show up for our first rehearsal back! We held the rehearsal in the sanctuary and used some of the same protective measures that we are now using in our worship on Sundays (every other pew; physical distancing on each pew; masks for those who need them; hand sanitizer; etc.). However, in our second rehearsal, due to the number of people we had coming, we were able to accommodate everyone in the choir room by using the same measures that we used in the sanctuary. This has made for a better choral experience by being able to hear the other voices in the room, albeit from a bit of a distance.

The choir did practice physical distancing and will continue to do so, and look forward to the time when we can sing as a choir in the services again.

As we continue to navigate these waters of an unprecedented pandemic, it does seem that we are surrounded by various levels of worry on all sides. With almost too much information coming at us, it can be easy to be swept away and engulfed by it all. Allow me to share some thoughts from a devotional that I read just this morning. Steve Arterburn has this to say:

“Because we are imperfect human beings, we worry. Even though we are Christians who have been given the assurance of salvation – even though we are Christians who have received the promise of God’s love and protection – we find ourselves fretting over the countless details of everyday life. Jesus understood our concerns when He spoke the reassuring words found in Matthew 6:25, “Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life...” As you consider the promises of Jesus, remember that God still sits in His heaven and you are His beloved child. Then, perhaps, you will worry a little less and trust God a little more, and that’s as it should be because God is trustworthy...and you are protected.”

Our former pastor, Dr. John Keller, was fond of quoting the great preacher and evangelist, Vance Havner, who said:

“It is not work that kills, but worry. And, it is amazing how much wear and tear the human mind and spirit can stand if it is free from friction and well-oiled by the Spirit.”

Finally, here is a great quote from the nineteenth-century Scottish author, poet and Christian minister, George MacDonald. Although his words are from another time, their message is strikingly contemporary and applicable today.

“It has been well said that no man ever sank under the burden of the day. It is when tomorrow’s burden is added to the burden of today that the weight is more than a man can bear. Never load yourselves so, my friends. If you find yourselves so loaded, at least remember this: it is your own doing, not God’s. He begs you to leave the future to Him and mind the present.”

I hope and pray that you have been encouraged, as I have, by these words of instruction, hope, and promise. May God give us His wisdom as we walk through these days ahead. He is still the Rock of our salvation and our living Hope!

Beach Parking at FBCHHI New Instructions

Church family,

We have had a difficult issue arise over the past several weeks. Our church parking lot has become a hot spot for unauthorized beach parking. This has always been a small issue but has spiraled as of late due to several factors.

With a huge increase in parking illegally, several other issues have also arisen.

One being that these individuals are crossing the street and accessing the beach via what we are told are private access points across the street rather than the Alder Lane public access. This is resulting in neighbors who are frustrated with the situation and, to some degree, with us. There has also been a terrible amount of disgusting (we can leave it at that) trash in our parking lot.

While we want to serve our community, our property is not being respected, our office and ministerial staff are wasting time that could be spent elsewhere, and this could further harm the relationship with our neighbors if nothing is done.

So we are asking for a couple of things from you:

1. Always Display Your FBCHHI Parking Pass on the Dashboard of Your Car/Truck/SUV

Make sure to display your parking pass when parking in our lot to go to the beach or for any other reason you may leave your car in our parking lot if you are not on campus. Due to the trash and neighbor tensions this situation has created, we may have to begin towing cars who are repeatedly and without permit using our lot for beach parking. We do try to leave warning slips on windshields and record license plates as a last warning, but the very

last thing we want to do is inadvertently tow a member's car... yikes! So please display your parking pass on your dash if you are here outside of normal worship hours and are not physically on our campus. This would include times when you go to the beach, leave your car to bicycle, caravan with someone else to a restaurant, etc.

Please note: You do NOT need to display a pass when simply coming to worship, Bible studies, committee meetings, etc. We only monitor our lot outside of regular meeting times when it's only staff on campus.


If you need a parking pass, come by the church office during regular business hours (Monday - Thursday, 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM, Friday, 9:00 AM - 12:00 PM,) and Lynda or Paulette will prepare one for you. Please bring us the color, make and model of your car, and your license tag number for our records when you come to get a parking pass.

2. Use the Alder Lane Beach Access

If you are going to the beach from our parking lot, please use the Alder Lane access point. There is a crosswalk across South Forest Beach that goes down the side of the Marriott Grande Ocean Resort. This is the same path we take for Easter Sunday Sunrise Services. We realize this is a little longer walk, but you will help us remain friendly with our neighbors.

Thank you for your understanding. We are trying to handle this issue for the reasons given above, but also in preparation for our re-launch of public services and the resumed regular use of our campus.


